We experienced another wonderful season of graded Summer Bible Camps at our Camp of the Good Shepherd (Louisville, NE) in June and July thanks to our amazing team of leaders and a great set of campers! We were blessed to have volunteer Deans from Kingsway Christian Church (Omaha), Southside Christian Church (Council Bluffs), and Northwest Christian Church (Council Bluffs). Many 'thank yous' go out to Becky Gomez, Casey & Gail BeDunnah, Stacy Haynes, Bryan Stigall, and Jeff & Alicia Kraft, for their dedicated leadership in deaning our graded Bible camps. Thank you, also, CGS staff, Interns, Sheepdogs and volunteer support staff for your tireless help at each session of camp this summer. You all contributed much to making our program a success!

Our 2023 Summer Bible Camps season (Theme: "Thirsty for God") ended on a very high note with the baptism of one of our long-time attending campers (Alana). Many serious, life-altering decisions for Christ were made by campers again this summer. What a privilege to share in these young people's lives, and to witness their personal decisions for Christ made public. We have set our theme for next year's camp season. It's: "Be the Change" [based on Eph. 2:10: "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (NIV).] We have also established the schedule (find the schedule online at cgs. camp) and have begun looking for leaders. We are seeing a hopeful trend among young people to desire authentic faith and worship based simply on the Word of God. We pray for God to lift up this new generation of believers and Christian leaders.

In addition to our regular graded Bible camp offerings, this year we sponsored a Women's Retreat in April, and a Men's Retreat ("FORGE") in October. Thanks to Nancy Jones and Kristin McInnis (Women's Retreat) and Brian Montieth (FORGE) for their leadership of these programs. We hope to offer more camp opportunities next year.

## Romania, Moldova & Ukraine summer ministry recap

I hit the ground running when I arrived in Romania on July 23rd, traveling immediately to Moldova with Vlad Pogor (FGCI's Moldova-based ministry representative) to help lead our annual Bible camp in Carpineni.

Vlad and his wife Carolina did a wonderful job organizing our 6-day camp for more than 100 of us campers and staff. Our theme was "I Need Jesus/ Am nevoie de Dumnezeu." Wow! It was a thrilling experience! We were blessed with around 30 Roma (Gypsy) friends, 50 Ukrainian refugees, and 20 kids and family members from Nisporeni, where we have our Home of the Good Shepherd and Ministry Center. It was a blast bringing all of these fine people together. We were speaking Romanian, Russian, Romany (Gypsy), Ukrainian and...English. [Thanks, interpreters!] I am amazed how God allowed us to have such a powerful time of praise, fel-

lowship, prayer, worship, preaching and teaching even with the challenges of language. God's Spirit was clearly present as we opened the Bible and let the Word of God flow through music and the spoken word.

I was so blessed to have the opportunity to preach and teach multiple times in Romanian. I've been pushing myself to learn and speak Romanian more intentionally over the past two years. And, though I might still sound like a five-year-old when I speak in Romanian, it was wonderful to be able to communicate without an interpreter (except for the Holy Spirit ) and to speak directly to my dear friends while looking them in the eye, providing a much more personal experience. Praise God!

Even with such a diverse group at camp, we saw wonderful comradery, patience and love demonstrated throughout this exciting week together. For many of our Ukrainian refugee moms and children, it was their first-ever Bible camp experience (or Christian event, period!). Many spiritual seeds were planted and watered during the week. Many tear-filled and life-changing decisions were made for Christ during the week, including many baptisms that took place after the camp finished.

One of my highlights during the camp in Carpineni was being there to witness the preaching of a fine sermon by one of our dear Roma (Gypsy) friends, Ruslan. Since Ruslan was just a small boy, he has been faithfully coming to our FGCI-led summer Bible day camps and overnight camps in Moldova. He has been a regular attender at the church in Vulcanesti. Now, Ruslan is a man. A few years ago, God touched Ruslan's heart and Ruslan put his trust in Jesus and was baptized. Now, Ruslan is one of the young Christian leaders in the church in Vulcanesti. Praise God! Carpineni, Moldova, this summer.

We are thankful for the church and the Christian leaders in Vulcanesti who have planted, watered and harvested souls in partnership with FGCI and other Chris-

tian groups serving in the area. Yes, we are in this ministry together (1 Cor. 3:8). God is at work in the hearts of the Roma people!



Our Home of the Good Shepherd family (pictured above—with a few extra friends) in Nisporeni, Moldova, continues to do well. Though we face the normal challenges of raising children, we see God at work in the precious lives of our kids: Veronica, Roma, Vlada, Diana, Ruslan, Zina and Antonela. We are blessed to have Vlad and Carolina Pogor, and Vlad's mother Silvia serving our kids so well and preparing them for a bright future in Christ. We are seeking more houseparents to serve in Moldova as Christian foster parents.

In addition to all of their other duties, Vlad and Carolina have been doing a wonderful job at bringing several youth and families from Nisporeni together for evangelism, Bible study and fellowship in our new worship center at Home of the Good Shepherd. For many of these children and families, attending any kind of "church service" has been rare or nonexistent. Now, there is a place where these often-marginalized people can worship God and be discipled. Several of these families and youth joined us for Bible camp this summer. God is so good.

### Home Improvements for our Roma friends

While we were in camp in Carpineni (Moldova) this summer, I learned of a housing issue facing one of our dear Roma campers. Radic is a strong

believer in Jesus. He has some special needs. He lives with and cares for his father and aunt (who also have special needs) in a small Roma village in Moldova. Though I've known and loved Radic for years, I've never visited his home. I found out that his house is badly in need of much structural attention and weatherizing (as are many other homes for Roma widows and poor families). So, we at FGCI are planning to help make Radic's house safer, more comfortable and more structurally sound. In March

2024, we are scheduled to take a team to repair/reconstruct Radic's home. ## Ukraine Relief continues into another year

When the Russia-Ukraine War broke out to our surprise on February 24, 2022, we had no idea it would persist this long. After more than 20 months of continual missile attacks, destruction and fighting in Ukraine, the war drags on at a virtual stalemate. But, we believe that we must continue to help the victims of this conflict.

Praise God! We have received several designated gifts to help us meet the urgent needs of thousands of affected Ukrainians over the course of the War. [We continue to need designated support for this ministry.] Our faithful support base (and that's you!) along with some generous grants from International Disaster Emergency Service (IDES)—including one that was just approved today! Praise God!!!—have allowed us to continue our efforts to bring hope and help to these hurting people who have escaped Ukraine as refugees, or who are stranded in dangerous places inside Ukraine.



These are Ukrainian children that FGCI has been serving since shortly after the outbreak of the War on February 24, 2022. We are very thankful for Vlad, our generous FGCI partners and our good friends at IDES.

Now, as we enter the cold season of the year (and it gets very cold in Ukraine in the winter), the refugees we serve (in Moldova) and the folks sheltering in place in Ukraine are concerned about how they will stay warm, have enough food and water to last through these cold months, and how they will procure clothing, coats and footwear to keep them protected from the harsh weather. These fears are compounded by the very real dangers of random missile fire regularly occurring in many areas of Ukraine.

Here is the most recent report (received on Nov. 8) that we received from our ministry partner, Vadim Sorochin (via our FGCI representative Vlad Pogor) regarding our ongoing Ukrainian War Victim relief service. Vlad writes: "Hello brother Joel. I want to share the wonderful report from Vadim on the trip he had to the dangerous regions [of Ukraine] Zaporozhye, Kherson, Orehov and others. In total, more than 250 people were helped with food products, medicines, Bibles, water and other things necessary for survival. Vadim and his team greatly encouraged those people through spiritual and material means. Vadim told me that while he was distributing food, a rocket flew about 500 meters away. It was very dangerous and scary, but everything was fine. People were grateful to the point of tears. The people said:





We thought that we had been forgotten, but now we see that God has not forgotten us.' Vadim writes: 'On this trip we bought food, medicine and water. People were very grateful and blessed by these necessary things. We weren't able to purchase wood or mattresses for the people, because there were a lot more people than we had planned for, and we didn't have enough money to buy [these things].' Vadim also says, Thank you from the bottom of my heart for your involvement in helping the Ukrainian people."

# HELP WANTED:

For God's Children International (FGCI) is praying for and actively seeking employees to serve in our Christian organization that serves institutionalized, abandoned, at-risk and marginalized children in Romania, Moldova and, recently, Ukraine. FGCI also serves adults with special challenges. FGCI owns Camp of the Good Shepherd (a Christian camp and retreat facility in Louisville, Nebraska). We have several positions that are available at this time. Please read the brief descriptions of each job below. Contact us if you feel that God may be calling you (or someone you know) to serve with us.

FGCI Associate Director (a full-time position). This job involves working across the entire spectrum of FGCI's ministry: with staff members, missions teams, ministry programs, children and adults being served, and in dealing with FGCI's financial and legal decisions and fundraising efforts, and accountability and communications with constituents. The FGCI Associate Director should be able and available to preach and teach from the Word of God, to travel overseas (and locally) to support, lead and promote the work of FGCI. The FGCI Associate Director will work closely with FGCI Executive Director Joel Burkum, and will be training to eventually assume the role of Executive Director of For God's Children International upon Joel's retirement.

**FGCI Business Manager** (a full-time or part-time position). The FGCI Business Manager job mainly consists in dealing with the financial affairs of FGCI's various ministries. The FGCI Business Manager should be familiar with accounting practices, budgeting, preparing financial reports, QuickBooks (the accounting program FGCI uses) online. The job involves dealing with constituents, banks, wire transfers, spread-sheets, income/expense issues, paying bills, etc. This position will also require work with FGCI's international staff, grant requests and accounting requirements, online donations and bill paying.

Assistant Bookkeeper (a part-time position). The part-time bookkeeper will be responsible to complement the work of FGCI's current Bookkeeper (Greg Carpenter) who will be working from overseas for the next several months. The Bookkeeper should have a knowledge of QuickBooks online, general bookkeeping practices, use of computers and preparing financial reports.

Missionary to Eastern Europe (a full-time position). FGCI would like to have an American couple to serve as missionaries to Eastern Europe (Romania/Moldova/Ukraine). The Missionary family would serve as Liaison between FGCI's Stateside staff and board of directors, and Eastern European FGCI staff, volunteers and government agencies. The Missionary family will work with FGCI missions team members and interns coming from the USA to serve in FGCI's diverse ministry sites in Eastern Europe. The Missionary family would also do Christian service in the local area where they would be serving (Romania, Moldova or Ukraine). The Missionary family would be responsible to raise financial support.

CGS Programs Director (a full-time or part-time position). We are seeking a person to oversee all of the programming, staffing (paid and volunteer), promotion and usage of Camp of the Good Shepherd (in Louisville, NE). The CGS Programs Director should be able and willing to preach and teach, and to promote CGS. The CGS Programs director should understand and be able to share the vision of Camp of the Good Shepherd. They should have the talents and abilities necessary to create and lead programs, fundraise, write grant proposals, create and choose curriculum, and inspire children and adults alike to use Camp of the Good Shepherd.

#### Workers needed in Romania, Moldova and Ukraine:

Houseparents for Home of the Good Shepherd (full-time position). We are seeking a couple to serve as houseparents ("Dad" and "Mom") for our Christian foster home in Nisporeni, Moldova (in western Moldova). Home of the Good Shepherd has been in existence for more than two decades. Currently, Home of the Good Shepherd has seven children in its care. Houseparents will need to speak Romanian fluently and have a deep love for children who have experienced tragedy or trauma.

Sunshine Room (for adults in need of occupational and/or physical therapy) Worker (full-time position). FGCI has worked in Zebil, Romania, for more than two decades, as we have served among boys with special needs, and with adults (18 years of age and older) with special needs or disabilities. For several years, we have worked with the Romanian government to provide care and therapy in our Sunshine Room (Camera Raze Soarelui) in the government center there. We have employed several local workers (Romanian) from the area, but have never been able to place a trained Occupational Therapist to work with adults with special needs. Currently, we are in the middle of renewing our contract with the government, and we are seeking certified occupational therapists to serve in the Sunshine Room. We would love to send workers from the States to serve in Zebil.
