

THE BEST YES – Session 6 – Part 1 ~ BUILDING A BEST YES LEGACY

Read through the Video notes starting on page 160 through 162.

- Share any thoughts that came to mind as you read these notes.
- As you were reading and thinking about the opening scripture (Ephesians 1:18) did any word or phrase come to mind regarding this idea of building a lifelong legacy of wisdom and Best Yes decisions?

Read question #3 on page 164.

- Can you think of anyone in your life who has left (or is leaving) this kind of legacy to you personally?
- The notes mentioned several biblical characters who left great legacies but also had great failures; but their failures didn't destroy their legacies. Thinking about the person you named above, what role do their failures or weaknesses play in how you view them and their legacy?

Read question #5 on page 166:

- We are living in a time of world-wide and personal unexpected hardships and uncertainty and disappointment. How would you describe the legacy you want your decisions to leave during this trying time?

Read question #6 on page 166:

- What examples or personal experiences can you think of that demonstrate what it means to do small things with great love?
- Do you find the idea that “the smaller the thing, the greater must be our love” challenging or encouraging? Why?

Read question #7 on page 167:

- How might it change the way you approach your decisions if the first question you asked was not, “How can I choose what's best in this situation?” but, “How can I choose Christ in this situation and get to know Him better?”

Bonus Material from Notes on Chapters 16-19 of *The Best Yes* book:

We are in the middle of unexpected events that change day-to-day.
